

or so many of us, renovating is a necessary evil and a way to take a buy from so-so to whoa. We hope the hard work will bear fruit. For Louisa and her husband Ryan, that's not the case – they know it will. "Oh no," she says. "We're born renovators. We love it!" Before purchasing this home near the beach in Sydney's highly prized Bondi, the couple renovated a property in nearby Rose Bay and another on the NSW Central Coast, which Louisa concedes was "a complete dump" until they worked their magic. She and Ryan also own a home in Byron Bay, and it's next on the list to spruce up.

"We love the challenge of renovating," says Louisa. "With this house, it was about taking something good and making it great." The only problem? They fall in love with the properties and don't want to sell them, which is the point of buying them in the first place. Luckily for them, this home is for living, not selling.

It was love at first sight, too. "We could see the potential for it to be beautiful," she says. "When we saw it online, it looked OK, but then we saw it in the flesh and it blew us away. The garden was a lot bigger than it appeared, and even though it's a duplex, it felt really spacious." The location was also a huge drawcard so, realising they were inspecting the house the day before its scheduled auction, they made an immediate offer.

The home had been renovated by its previous owners. "They spent a lot of money in some areas," says Louisa, pointing to certain fixtures such as a sunken polished granite bath. However,

she and Ryan had plans to make the home fit in better with its coastal surroundings. "We wanted to lighten it, make it a bit warmer and more beach-friendly," says Louisa.


Having worked with interior designer Kristy McGregor on a previous project, they called her and asked for her expertise.

The renovation was comparatively small, with not a single wall being knocked down, but it made a world of difference in opening up the space and giving it an air-filled, Scandinavian vibe. "It was quite dark," says Kristy. "The walls were a really 'nothing' beige, the window frames and doors were painted very dark, the floors were a spotted gum floorboard. It didn't reflect the location, being so close to the beach and north-facing."

The existing kitchen had dark wood and outdated fixtures and was the first to go. In its place now stands a studio-style kitchen fitted against a downstairs wall. "We absolutely love the kitchen," says Louisa. "It's very much a cook's kitchen, with a steam oven and a conventional one." Storage works hard to both streamline the space and declutter. "There's a hidden cupboard for the appliances," she adds. "There's not a lot of space, so we want to make it as tidy as we can." The floors were refinished and the walls, window frames and doors were painted white.

Furniture and its placement was a significant consideration. "Being a duplex, it's an odd layout," says Louisa. "We wanted to maximise the space and still make it feel open." A vast custom dining table, for instance, fills the room, and a long sofa opposite the kitchen makes that area seem cosy.


Outside, Louisa and Ryan were intent on creating a sanctuary. "The garden is quite big for the area, and we wanted to capitalise on that," she says. "We kept the beautiful frangipanis and planted almost everything else, to give a sense of privacy and seclusion." Artificial grass was laid because the garden doesn't get a lot of sun. "You have to get the right fake grass!" says Louisa, laughing. "They come in different grades, and some look more real than others. We laid down one type and it looked so artificial – it was terrible. The blades were a bit longer and looked off, somehow. But this, unless you're up close, you can't tell. It's just perfect."


An outdoor shower was installed to wash off after beach visits, and even here, in an area that's almost totally functional, the couple have pulled off a certain elegance. "Don't you love the exposed piping?" asks Louisa. "And the pink timber wall? That's actually the look of the timber itself – it's not painted. We put it in and planned to paint it, but then we saw the freshness of the green plants in contrast to the pink and thought, 'Ooh, that might stay.' So we might change it but, for now, it's ideal."


The garden, she continues, is exactly the oasis they'd hoped for. "People come over and say, 'Oh wow, it's so quiet and cool down here. You wouldn't imagine Bondi is right outside the front door.' And you really wouldn't."
